## Rugby World Cup 2023

Even though rugby isn't everybody's cup of tea, a lot is going on in the sport as France are hosting the 2023 Rugby World Cup.

Rugby began thanks to an unconventional gesture: that of William Webb Ellis, a student who took the ball in his hands while playing football in 1823 and crossed the field with it, breaking the rules of the game at the time

The creative team behind the Opening Ceremony of the Rugby World Cup 2023 have chosen to follow in this path, moving away from the usual ceremony standards, and to tell a story that goes back to the roots of French culture. Led by Jean Dujardin (actor and co-writer of this ceremony), some thirty individuals embodied France's culture, as well as its art of living at the ceremony on September 8th. The 80,000 fans at the Stade de France and millions of TV viewers were taken on a poetic and colourful journey through a story of romance and brotherhood.

This World Cup signified the first time the All Blacks, three-time winners of the tournament, had ever lost a pool match. No wonder France were serenaded off the pitch with a rousing rendition of La Marseillaise. Temperatures that lingered in the 80's in fahrenheit ( 27 C ), and the frenetic pace of the game meant the players didn't have anything left in the tank to celebrate.

For England, George Ford opened with an incredible 27 points (all scored by drop goal or penalty kick), which gave England a massive head start in the battle of the group stages. Ford made his England debut as a replacement against Wales in the penultimate round of the 2014 Six Nations Championship as England claimed their first triple crown in over a decade.

France, Ireland, Wales, and England topped their respective groups.

In the final, South Africa beat New Zealand 12-11 in a nail-biting game. This is after they won a closely fought battle in the semis against England 16-15.

Not to be in the tournament the end for England, but hopes are high for the Six Nations in February.


## What is the JMC?

Have you ever wanted to take part in the National and the International Maths Competitions? Well, this is for you!
The Junior Maths Challenge (JMC) is a set of maths questions, taking 2 minutes for each question on average Year 8 and 9 top set maths groups will take on the challenge. All questions are multiple choice and there are 25 questions, the first 15 questions are the easiest, getting harder till the end
What levels can I achieve?

## UK Maths Trust

By getting questions correct, you can earn points. Each correct answer earns you 5 points. Getting a question wrong earns you no points. If you get a certain amount of points, you have bronze, silver, and gold levels of achievement. In 2023, you needed 52 points for a bronze, 66 points for a silver and 82 for a gold. If you get above 88 marks, you enter what is called the Kangaroo. This is a challenge for people who pass the JKMT challenges. But if you get even more points, up to 113 points, you can enter the Olympiad, which is an international competition! Very few people get to this stage, 300,000 take on the challenge and only 12,000 on average get through!

If you get to the Kangaroo or Olympiad stage, then you need to take a second test. Then you can get even more points, and, on the Kangaroo stage, some people get to participate in the Olympiad!

## Y11 Buddhism Trip

Year 11 had the exciting opportunity to visit the Manjushri Kadampa Meditation Centre and Buddhist Temple at Conishead Priory in Ulverston on 3rd and 4 th October. Over 80 pupils went on each day, as part of their GCSE Religious Studies course. They were taught about the Buddhist faith by experienced monks and nuns and other volunteers, helping them further understand the beliefs and practices that they have been studying in school.

Pupils were taken on a guided tour of the priory and temple and took part in a meditation workshop in the temple itself. They were guided through the Buddhist technique of 'mindfulness of breathing' as an aid to calming the mind and experiencing peace. A number of pupils are now going to try meditation at home as a way of resting and relaxing. Afterwards, they enjoyed learning about some key features of the temple, including the shrine and many golden statues and artefacts. One of the most interesting aspects of the trip was the circumambulation of the temple; a feature of Buddhist worship, where you walk around the temple contemplating your own thoughts. On one of the days, a group of pupils also took part in a dramatic retelling of the life of the Buddha.



The year 11's also had the opportunity to explore the beautiful surrounding area, spending some time in the woods and at the beach. Many pupils also enjoyed a visit to the gift shop. The monks at the centre commented that Carr Hill pupils had been calm and very well-behaved and the staff accompanying them were impressed with their mature and respectful approach to the day. All of the year 11's were a credit to the school and themselves and our staff really enjoyed taking them on this visit.

## Female Empowerment

This argument was depicted in her book "Sister outsider" and is credited for shaping a more inclusive feminist movement.

On 4th October, we welcomed the Award-winning children's author Frank Cottrell-Boyce into school, for a talk and book signing for his recently released new book 'The Wonder Brothers'. Frank wowed the audience of our Year 7 students and approximately 150 children from primary schools in the local area, with his stories and a couple of readings from his most recent book 'The Wonder Brothers' and a previous book 'Cosmic' (first published in 2008). Frank asked the students in the audience about their experiences of their first day of school, and he talked to them about the main ideas of the new book, introducing them to the giant rabbit and asking them what they would do if Blackpool Tower disappeared.
'The Wonder Brothers' is a story of two diminutive magicians, who set out to retrieve the Blackpool Tower which has dramatically vanished in the night. The book is full of tricks, twists and deceptions - 'Maybe you don't believe me. Maybe you don't believe in magic. I bet you will by the time you've heard what happened to us.'

Frank then answered a range of questions from the audience, and the students were so patient waiting for their turn to get their book signed.

Elaine Silverwood, of Silverwood Events and Book, Bean \& Ice Cream in Kirkham, was the main organiser of the event. Elaine arranged for Frank to attend and felt it would be a fantastic event to hold here at school. The press were also in attendance and took photos of the event.


Ms Fry arranged for 4 students to meet Frank before the event started, these students were put forward by Year 7 teachers / mentors as being incredibly hard working and having exemplary behaviour during their time in Year 7. Georgina, Jake, Jessica and Rhys had time to chat with Frank, whilst they finished their lunch and even had their photo taken by the photographer from the Blackpool Gazette.

Mr Waller wrote, "It was lovely to see the hall full with 300 Year 7 and primary children for the visit of author Frank Cottrell-Boyce. Frank was talking about his new book, 'The Wonder Brothers' and told the young people about his writing. I didn't know before the event that he'd written the script for the famous Diamond Jubilee scene of her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II with Paddington Bear! He signed 129 copies of his book at the end for those who had purchased one."

The aim of the club is to develop a further understanding of Geography outside of the classroom and look at how we can promote sustainability within the school. In their first session The Eco Explorers needed to get to know each other so they created their own flag on biscuits. Some used inspiration from traditional flags while others chose to demonstrate their own creativity by adding their own designs including tractors to their new flag.

The Eco Explorers also participated in the National Education Nature Park and Climate Action Award on the 4th October. This was an activity called the Hidden Nature Challenge which asked school children around the world to investigate nature around their school area. The aim was to find nature occurring in unexpected places, find plant or animal life in what could be considered a nature free zone as well as finding the smallest sign of nature in different areas around the school. The group went out with clipboards and a camera to document the results. The images were uploaded to ArcGIS a website specialising in Geographical Information System (GIS) and will be used to show how much nature is around schools globally.
